Green News

I hope you are all weathering this pandemic storm. It reminds me of our time sailing our yacht 'Songster' from New Zealand to Fiji in 2008 when we were caught in a bad storm and had to batten down the hatches and stay below to weather it out over 3 days. At least during the current lockdown we have the comforts of home and no seasickness or the threat of a disaster. After the third night of being thrown around in huge seas we opened the hatch to see blue skies, unfurled the sails and made our way towards Fiji. I hope we will experience the time when we can open our doors and feel free to go out and socialise once again.

The builder has now completed all his work with the installation or the new irrigation system. The system has been tested, set up and programmed to give the most efficient way of irrigating the green. The system has been running for a couple of weeks now and operates in the early hours twice a week. The whole operation takes in the region of 5 hours and puts 11 cubic metres of water onto the green. The reason for the length of time is that the water tank has to refill. Using WhatsApp and phone calls to Richard Keech, he looks after the green, between us Richard has completed setting the system up for us. Without his co-operation and technical knowledge we could not have got this far.

However, there is still work to be completed - the electrical system has to be reworked and made good. I needed to prove the system worked so set up a temporary electrical supply which now has to be made permanent. This will take me 2 days minimum to do with no interruptions.

Unfortunately I did not calculate just how much spoil would be left over, we have 6 tons to remove - a large amount. The quotations I got coincided with the lockdown and people were taking advantage and quoting exorbitant prices. If you have any suggestions of how this can be removed, or contacts please let me know.

Richard and I have worked out a schedule for looking after the green using Bowls England's recommendations under the Covid 19 lockdown. The green at the present moment is looking superb and is cut to 9mm. It has been fed and scarified but it will take about 2 weeks of cutting before it will be good enough to bowl on. The grass must not be stressed by cutting it too short too quickly. Other outstanding items are the refitting of the rink markers and scoreboard holders, Roy has got the jig for scoreboard holders and I have remade all the green markers. This will take 2-3 days minimum to measure and reinstall. Volunteers will be asked for in due course.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Monday morning irrigation feasibility group, especially David Irvine, for all their input. It is David's basic principle design that I have used within our club's monetary constraints. There will be the usual beginning of season work party day to prepare the green for opening.

Looking forward to seeing everyone again. Keep safe, stay home. Brian Palmer, Green Secretary

I remember, when I was 18 and went to England to learn English working as a land labourer earning 6P a week, my first international call to Holland of 3 minutes, cost me 2/6 p and it took at least 20 minutes before being connected. Now in Panama . We left Ledbury, Caroline was born there and I had my business Treelinks, 25 years ago. We bought a motor home in Toronto, where my brother lives and after Alaska, drove to Panama a 6 months trip. We built a small replica of Eastnor Castle, my daughter was the first to get married there, which we sold 3 years ago and is now the most popular Hostel in Panama. Look up "Bambuda castle - Boquete". Caroline can shop on Monday, Wednesday and Friday between 11 and 13hrs. I can on Tuesday and Thursday, same time . NO ONE AT ALL on Saturday and Sunday . Our government did an amazing job limiting infections. Only 121 fatalities so far .
